Jack came at life with the true heart of a servant. He always looked for ways to positively impact those whose lives he touched. As Pastor, co-founder of Valley View Food-bank, Town Councilman, Vice Mayor, husband, father and grandfather, he always looked for ways to better the lives of those around him. He was there "...for the ups and downs, through thin or flush..." he was there.

The Book of Ecclesiastes, Chapter 3 tells us "There is a time for everything...a time to weep and a time to laugh, a time to mourn and a time to dance..." Jack, we loved the time we spent with you, now we mourn for our loss. "...thanks, Jack for always being there..."



Smoke Detectors DO Save Lives

ne of the responsibilities of the Fire Marshal's office is to perform Fire Investigations. There are several certified Fire Investigators within the Sun City Fire and Medical Department, but all of the Investigations are channeled through the Fire Prevention office. Since becoming a Fire Investigator, I've been able to see first-hand how many different things can cause a fire and the damaging effects a fire can have on a persons belongings, or even their own life.

Recently and unfortunately I was called out at 11:00 in the night because we had a significant structural house fire with partial collapse in Sun City.

The residential fire was in a duplex with one elderly man in one side and a couple in the other side. When I arrived on the scene, the fire was significantly extinguished and the fire crews were still putting out hot spots.

The entire roof on one end of the duplex had collapsed. This makes a very difficult task for a fire investigator because the ceiling, insulation, roof structure and shingles are all lying on top of the evidence as far as determining the source of the fire.

Now comes the part where you need to me-





thodically put things back in place to determine the area of fire origin, the point of fire origin and the cause of the fire.

One of the first things an investigator does on a fire scene is to walk the property to determine any hazards that may exist. It happened that this residence had the Air-Conditioning units on the roof. Since the roof had been compromised on the South unit, the air conditioning unit was balancing on a wall that was still remaining. This is something that the investi-

gator will note, point out to the command on scene, and not allow other individuals into the residence.

The next thing is to interview everyone involved. First is to talk with the Battalion Chief in command of the fire. Find out what they

saw when they arrived, any casualties, which engines were first on scene, and the fire-fighting measures taken. Then you interview the people, hopefully the residents, to find out what they saw, heard, smelled, or any other clues they may have.

One of the people I interviewed was the elderly man who lived in the south unit. We'll call him Henry. Henry was across the street in a neighbor's lawn chair with a blanket around him. Henry is 88 years old. I asked Henry if he was OK, and if I could get him anything. Then we discussed what he could remember about the night. Henry told me he went to bed about 7:00 p.m., and was awakened by the smoke alarm going off in the hallway next to his bedroom. Keep in

mind, that our engine companies were dispatched at 10:31 p.m., and arrived on scene at 10:34 p.m. If that smoke detector would not have awakened Henry, we would be having a much different story. Henry lived in the south end of the home that had collapsed!

This is actual proof that Smoke Detectors Save Lives. Henry said when he heard the smoke detector he initially thought that he had forgotten to turn off his TV. Then he realized it was the smoke alarm making the noise. He got out of bed, looked down the hallway and saw smoke and flames. He went back to his room, threw on some clothes and made his way to the front door to exit the house. By that time the fire engines were arriving. Unfortunately, it was too late to save the south end of the structure. The girder truss had already failed and the chain reaction of other structural components failing had already begun. The good news is that

The good news is that the smoke detector did its job by waking Henry and warning him to get out. Please, take this true story seriously and verify your smoke detectors are working; and if you don't have one — GET ONE!

Please PLEASE keep your pets safe, at home and preferably inside with loud music, white noise, Thundervest, melatonin, whatever! I had a dog that would panic to the point of needing a prescription to alleviate upset. The doggy downers were life changing for the poor girl; however she was a severe case. Please ask your veterinary professional before purchasing over the counter supplements, there are many new products he or she can recommend that will be specific to your dog's needs.

COLLARS! Please have your pets collared wearing contact information with your current phone number!! In case your pet goes missing...

I saw on the news that distemper is up in our county. If your pet is displaying any symptoms (As per petmed. com: muscle twitching,

weakness or paralysis, uncoordinated movements, seizures, increased sensitivity to touch or pain), please..... A trip to the vet.

A heartfelt thank you to Margaret Chittenden, her articles are so informative and interesting. Last month she wrote about exercising pets in the cool(er) temperatures the mornings and evenings. She stated it is not recommended that you exercise dogs on pavement any time after the air temperature and pavement get too hot. If you must...think twice, and please consider paw protection for your furry friend. Well that made me curious, so I did an asphalt temperature check.

Did you know, as of May 31: 8:30 AM the asphalt is 95 degrees.

At 10:00 AM (air temp 90) the asphalt is 120 degrees

At 12:30 PM it's 97 degrees out and the asphalt is 139 degrees

As per the Journal of the American Medical Association: At 125 degrees F, skin destruction can happen in 60 seconds.

And it's only May as I write this article: If you want to conduct your own accurate test of asphalt heat, place the



back of your hand or bare foot on the pavement. Wait 3-5 seconds.....If it hurts, DON'T WALK FIDO! Wait an hour and fry an egg.

Here's a look at Youngtown's ordinance Sec. 9.04.010. It is unlawful for any person within town limits to blast or use gun powder, fireworks, or other explosive devices unless authorized by the Town council.

The Big fireworks that explode and go up in the air are still illegal to purchase and use in Arizona at ANY time such as bottle rockets, firecrackers, roman

The U.S. flag stands for our nation and the shared history, pride, principles, and commitment of its people. When we properly display this powerful symbol, we signal our respect for everything it represents.



The flag shouldn't be flown in inclement weather unless it's an all-weather flag.



Flags displayed at night should be properly illuminated.



In a time of national mourning, hang the flag at half-mast.

The flag can be flown every day, but it is often flown to show patriotism on these observances:

New Year's Day **Inauguration Day**

Martin Luther King Jr.'s Birthday

Lincoln's Birthday Washington's Birthday

(Presidents Day) National Vietnam War Veterans Day

When displaying the flag ...



From your porch, place the union (blue section) at the peak of the staff.



Against a wall or on a window, place the union (blue section) at the top left corner.



On your vehicle, clamp the staff to the right front fender.



With another flag, place the U.S. flag to your left when crossed.



Keep your flag completely dry and folded properly — into a triangle, with the union (blue section) visible — before storing it in a well-ventilated area. If the flag is damaged or worn out, it should be disposed of with dignity.



The flag should not touch anything below it or rest on the ground.

With the dry summer heat firmly established we welcome the arrival of the monsoon season to bring in much needed moisture to our Sonoran Desert. Although welcome relief, monsoon season can often be a

dangerous season.

Monsoon Safety Dust Storms:

PULL ASIDE, ALIVE! If you encounter a dust storm, and cannot avoid driving into it, pull off the road as far as you can safely do so. Turn off your headlights and taillights. Put your vehicle in "PARK," and/ or engage your parking brake, and take your foot off the brake (so your brake lights are not illuminated.) Other motorists may tend to follow tail lights in an attempt to get through the dust storm, and may strike your vehicle from behind

Lightning:

When thunder roars, go indoors. If you can hear thunder, you are close enough to be struck by lightning. There is no place outside that is safe from a lightning strike. Remaining indoors for 30 minutes after seeing the last lightning and hearing the last thunder will eliminate the risk at the end of storms.

Flash Floods:

The rainfall from a monsoon storm can be of a large volume in a short time span, causing some

road flooding. Driving around barricades is illegal and dangerous. Do not let children play near storm drains or washes after a heavy rain. Roadbeds may be washed out under floodwaters. Never drive through flooded roadways. As little as ten inches of water can float average-sized cars, minivans, SUVs and trucks. Strength of the flow is the critical force. When in doubt, wait it out, or find a safer route.

Dogs:

Any dog brought into a town park shall at all times be under the constant control of the owner or the person in custody of such dog; dogs at all times must be on a leash, not longer than six feet in length, except that a dog may be off-leash inside the Citizens' Dog Park located at Alabama Ave. and 113th Ave. The owner or person in custody of a dog shall immediately pick up all dog droppings (fecal matter), place them in a closed or sealed container and deposit them in a park trash receptacle or remove

them from the park.

Community Pride: Please do not throw trash out of your car onto the street or leave it in the park. Not only is it illegal, it's just plain ugly and wrong. Do your part to keep our Town clean and show your Community Pride by throwing trash in trash containers. We do see people in Town picking up trash that others have left behind, to those people, we say; "thank you very much for showing your community pride".
