9-Volt Battery Storage

batteries -volt power smoke alarms, household items and toys. They can be found in most homes. But these batteries can be a fire hazard if not stored safely or disposed of with care. In the recent past, one particular video has been present on social media, warning of improperly stored 9-volt batteries devastating sparking house fires. I thought this would be a good time to discuss this topic.

We all have junk drawers in our homes, but did you know what's in there could actually start a fire? Here's the bottom line on the potential dangers of 9-volt batteries and what you need to know before the flames start. The video clip, recounts how a battery fire destroyed the home of Fort Collins,

CO, resident Dave Miller. It begins with the dramatic audio recording of Miller's call to 911. "I have a fire," said David Miller of Fort Collins, Colorado while on the phone to 911. "I need the fire department here," he added in a distressed tone. "Inside your house?" the operator asked. "Yes, inside my house," Miller said. "Sir, hang up the phone and evacuate," the dispatcher directed. Miller barely made it out alive, but watched his house burn

That day in April of 2011 is a day Miller will never forget. "I couldn't believe it... It's real... batteries can be dangerous," said Miller while the Fire Investigator interviewed him at Fire Station #1 in Fort Collins.

Miller's home in Fort Collins, CO caught fire after he changed the 9-volt batteries out of his smoke detectors and he put the old ones in a paper bag to be recycled. "The morning of the fire, I had moved the bag around and that's apparently what caused the batteries to get into the right position to



short against each other," explained Miller.

How can this happen? Well, first of all, these batteries carry 9 volts compared to some other batteries such as a AA battery is 1-1/2 volts. Sun City Fire Marshal, Jim Fox, states that a coin can go from 74 degrees to more than 150 degrees within minutes of touching the two terminals on a 9-volt battery. The thinner the metal, the more tendency it will have to heat up to an even higher temperature.

There have been documented tests to verify the dangers of 9-volt batteries their exposed terminals. One of the experiments involves putting the open batteries in a junk drawer with all kinds of stuff including keys, a coffee filter, steel wool for washing pots and pans, misc. tools, pens, paper and more. After several tries of opening and closing the drawer, on the third try of closing the drawer with a 9-volt battery inside, the battery slid and made contact with the steel wool. Any one of the metallic items in the drawer can short the two terminals of the battery and generate that heat to where it will catch the paper on fire, then it will catch your cabinets on fire and then pretty soon your house is on fire. Just like the fire in Colorado, once the terminals of that battery come in contact with something metal, the result is heat; and with the other items in the drawer, the flames got going.

What does this all mean to you? You can prevent these fires by simply putting the plastic caps back on the terminals of the 9-volt batteries, putting electrical tape over the terminals or storing the batteries in their original packaging.

The 9-volt batteries are the focus of concern because of the placement of the terminals sideby-side and their more common use in typical homes. Maybe not every battery is going to start a fire but we know that they can, so it's a simple thing to prevent.

However, maybe the most ironic thing about 9-volt batteries is that these same batteries are used to power your smoke detectors. And it is kind of ironic that this life-saving battery can also start a fire as well. It's a rare phenomenon that does happen. When you just throw the batteries in your drawer and you don't think about it, but in that drawer is all that other junk that it could come in contact with and then you have that potential for the fire.

Keep batteries in original packaging until you are ready to use them. If they are loose, keep the posts covered with masking, duct, or electrical tape. Prevent the posts from coming in contact with metal objects.

Sometimes we had our doubts that the weather would change on us as we were living and working in the hot and often humid conditions in the valley of the sun. As in life, when we are in the middle of an uncomfortable situation, it can be hard to see that it is temporary and that we must get through it in order to reap a reward. Our reward is living with beautiful Sonoran Desert weather, for the next 6 months. The cooler air is so welcoming, we feel renewed and refreshed!

Halloween will be here soon, with many children parading through the streets going door to door in search of their next cavity. Please be careful driving through Town, as many ghosts and goblins will be walking after

This Monsoon season has blessed us with an abundance of rain, making up for the last two monsoon seasons that were very dry. The abundance of rain has also produced an abundance of weeds. Public Works sprays weeds in the alleyways two times a year, once in the spring and once in the fall. You may not be aware of this, but the area in the alley behind your home, actually is your property. You the resident are responsible for the maintenance of this area. The Town does have right of way easements to conduct utility repairs and upgrades in this area as well as, conducting right of way operations in the front area of your home along the street side. Regardless of the Town's right of way jurisdiction, it is the residents' responsibility



to maintain these right of ways, keeping them weed free and debris free. Just as the resident must maintain their entire front yard to the street, they must also maintain their back yard from their fence to the Community Pride starts with the residents in the community. Maintain your property; improve neighborhood and vour property values rise. Your community also becomes a more desirable area to reside in when the homes are well maintained and attractive. The Broken Window Theory is a criminological theory

that states that visible signs of crime, anti-social behavior, and civil disorder create an urban environment that encourages further crime and disorder, including serious crimes. The theory suggests that policing methods that target minor crimes, such as vandalism, loitering, public drinking and jaywalking, help to create an atmosphere of order and lawfulness.

Along with the cooler weather and more people getting out and about, the Town seems to experience an increase in vandalism. Vandalism is "action

involving destruction of or damage to public or private property". The term also includes criminal damage such as graffiti and defacement directed towards property without permission of the owner. Graffiti is the most common type of property vandalism (35%) according to the Bureau of Justice Statistics. How can Youngtown citizens help to stop vandalism? Get to know your neighbors. It is important that you know the people around you and in your community. This makes it much easier to spot someone that doesn't belong and may be there to simply cause problems. Form a community association or neighborhood watch program. You can't fight vandalism on your own, so it is important that you engage your neighbors and others in your community in your battle as well. This not only helps them take a more active interest, but it also provides them with the opportunity to get to know each other. Hold parties and social activities in your neighborhood. Getting to know your neighbor goes beyond knowing their name and face. You should develop a friendship or trust of some type so they know to watch your back while you are watching theirs. Meet new neighbors as they move in. A great way to spot new neighbors is by watching homes that are for sale. Once you see the sign disappear go over and introduce yourself. Talk to your neighbors if you see something suspicious. Even if it is nothing, talking to them allows them to see you are concerned and take an interest, which will encourage them to do the same. If you live next to one of the Town's parks, please be observant for potential vandalism. If you observe someone damaging something in the park, place a phone call to the MCSO office at 602-876-1011. The residents are the eyes and ears of the community.


AARP Historic Chapter #1
